Yummy food, many beautiful door prizes, lots of volunteers and attendees from several other local women's clubs - Yorba Linda, Orange and Tustin. Many of the attendees were local Placentia residents, out for a night of fun. Miss Yorba Linda, Johnna Breault, and Miss Canyon Hills, Ireland Mercado, were on hand sharing in the fun and assisting with door prizes. This was the first community appearance for the young ladies.

When I think of Spring elections come to mind, and we will be selecting the nominating committee at the March general meeting. The election process will be slightly shorter than what we are accustomed, due to the change in the beginning and ending months. I can hardly wait to see who will be the newest president and board members!

In keeping with the history of some of the outstanding members from California, this month I am highlighting Helen Gahagan Douglas (1900-1980). Decades before Ronald Reagan, stage star and California celebrity Helen Gahagan Douglas made the transition from acting to politics to become one of her party's standard-bearers. In an era when Cold War priorities often marginalized domestic reforms, Douglas became a beacon to New Deal liberals, who hoped to push economic and social legislation into the post–World War II period. Impatient with the institutional pace and intricacies of the House, Representative Douglas used her skills as an actress and her fame to speak passionately about topics ranging from equal rights for women to civil rights for African Americans and protections for the American worker. Helen Gahagan was born in Boonton, New Jersey, on November 25, 1900. From 1922 to 1938, she pursued a career as an opera singer and an actress, starring in a variety of shows and plays. In a 1930 Broadway hit, Tonight or Never, Helen Gahagan met and costarred with her future husband, Melvyn Douglas. They married on April 5, 1931, and left New York City to relocate in Los Angeles as Melvyn pursued a film career. Douglas's sole committee assignment throughout her six years in the House reflected one of her many areas of focus: Foreign Affairs. She backed American participation in the United Nations, supported the implementation of the Bretton Woods Agreements, which created the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund, and consistently challenged U.S. policy early in the Cold War. Douglas also supported Philippine independence and the creation of a Jewish state in Israel. President Harry S. Truman appointed her as an alternate U.S. Delegate to the United Nations Assembly.

During a period when the Jim Crow laws still applied in the nation's capital, Helen Douglas used her outsider status to challenge prevailing racial attitudes. The first white Representative with African Americans on her staff, she also sought to desegregate Capitol restaurants. Douglas also attacked the practice of poll taxes, which effectively prevented many southern African Americans from voting, and she urged passage of antilynching legislation. Douglas retired to private life as a lecturer and a successful author. She later returned to the theater and performed in two Broadway plays. In 1964 she was again in the political spotlight when President Lyndon Johnson appointed her as the Special Ambassador to head the United States delegation to the inauguration ceremonies for President William V.S. Tubman of Liberia. She also authored a book based on her close friendship with Eleanor Roosevelt.

The Coin March recipient for March is **Mary's Kitchen Pantry** in Anaheim. They started as a soup kitchen in 1984 serving just over 60 people with 2 hot meals a day in the city of Orange. In 2024 Mary's Kitchen Pantry adopted a mission of food sustainability and is working to put 'sustainability in motion' and they operate as:

(1) A food rescue: Perfectly good food is rescued from grocery outlets and brought to the Mary's Kitchen Pantry Orange County facility where it is sorted and prepared for families and individuals.

(2) A mobile pop-up food pantry: Where transportation barriers may exist, free food is delivered to communities where families and individuals are experiencing food insecurity. Food is transported via the Mary's Kitchen Pantry farmer's-market styled 'Mobile Pop-Up' to various communities around Orange County where it is then set up for selection by those who need it.

(3) A participant in food waste recycling: Any food that is not given out or passes its prime is processed at the Mary's Kitchen Pantry facility where it is organized as biowaste and prepared for recycling.

Today they rescue 20 tons of food per month and get it to more than 16,000 food insecure people who need it. They are a deserving non-profit organization and will very much appreciate our donation.
